

Forest conservation and management













- We were able to purchase an additional 75.8 ha of land for full protection.
- A team of biologists conducted field work in our project area to document moss species such as Buxbaumia viridis and Dicranum viride.
- Our new GIS specialist started working on maps of the riparian habitats and their invasive species.
- We have established 50 monitoring plots for ecological restoration and 50 monitoring plots for model natural forests. Also, we have inventoried erosion problems on tractor tracks for repair.







- Aqua Crisius Fishing Association and FCC are partners in managing the south-eastern rivers of the Făgăraş Mountains.
- This summer, a dream has come true: Aqua Crisius has released the first 500 specimens of Grayling (Thymallus thymallus), an emblematic fish species, which is again part of the ecosystem of the eastern Făgăraş Mountains!
- Grayling have been extinct in these waters for over 40 years.

<u>Video</u>

 Grayling have been a protected species in Romania since 2010 and we believe their presence in the Făgăraş waters is essential.







Ecological restoration

- After the final weeding of the season, we carried out an inventory of the saplings in our tree nurseries.
- Together with seasonal workers hired from the local communities, we have started cutting the autumn grass around the saplings to avoid suffocation during winter.











02 Ecological restoration

- We collected and prepared sycamore, rowan, and juniper seeds for seeding.
- Before reaching maturity, stone pine seeds are often taken by birds, so the amount of fruit we could harvest was relatively low. Still, we managed to collect enough seeds for our greenhouse.
- We took the cover off the green house to accustom the saplings to lower temperatures.











Wildlife monitoring

- What an intensive summer! The red deer DNA sampling season was finished, with a total 410 scat samples collected.
- We appreciate the enormous effort of the wildlife monitoring team and the involvement of many other rangers from our team together with four volunteers.
- In late September we installed camera traps to help monitor the red deer rut.

 The bison herd is doing well. We keep monitoring them and will soon bring more to the region for release.








Marmots and eagle monitoring

 Golden Eagle and marmot monitoring has begun as a first step towards developing a conservation plan for Golden Eagles. The wellbeing of marmots, as one of the main prey species of eagles, is crucial for their survival.









Wildlife management:

- We have registered several complaints concerning damage caused by wild boar destroying pastureland.
- Large carnivores have killed three cows and one sheep in our wildlife management concessions, which we have compensated with animals from our own cattle and sheep herd.
- Our rangers are out every day to prevent wildlife from getting close to the villages and to install electrical fences at hotspots for conflicts.

COBOR biodiversity farm

- This <u>project</u> has proven its viability.
- It is a perfect blend of high nature value grasslands, biodiversity conservation, organic farming, a cosy tourist and business destination, charismatic Transylvanian Grey Cattle, a breeding facility for the Carpathian shepherd dogs, and the best place for horse livery in the region.



 August and September were busy months at the farm: hay making, gardening, taking care of all the cattle, horses and Carpathian shepherd dogs and, of course, all our human guests.











 We want to preserve the sweet as well as the strong, sharp tastes of vegetables, so we have bottled tomato paste and braided the onions for winter.









- Our partners from a multinational company in Braşov have once again donated encyclopaedias, story and activity books, dictionaries, poetry and literature to the children that study at the local school in Cobor. Thank you!




- In August, we hosted a visit of a number of <u>Romanian environmental</u> <u>NGOs</u> to our project area.
