Forest conservation and management





Ecological restoration

- As the snow started melting in the lower altitude areas, we started working in our tree nurseries:
- Ploughing the land to extend the planting area in the existing tree nurseries
- Taking young dwarf pine and spruce saplings out of the greenhouses and replanting them in the tree nurseries for another 2-4 years until they are fit to be planted.
- Taking out the saplings ready to be planted for the spring restoration activities and transporting them to the mountains
- Public funding together with your donations made this possible.



Wildlife conservation



- We manage 78,000 ha (five wildlife management concessions) in the southern Făgăraş Mountains, and we are creating a model of human-wildlife coexistence based on *prevention intervention compensation*.
- Prevention involves the donation of Carpathian shepherd dogs and the installation of electric fences to reinforce night-time security around the households or farms. So far, we have donated 51 dogs and the programme continues. Livestock farmers grazing animals in the Făgăraş Mountains can sign up to receive dogs at a.aldea@carpathia.org. The 40 electric fences provided free of charge to local farmers, who have experienced conflicts with wildlife, have proven effective.
- The **intervention** involves the *rapid intervention teams* acting to resolve direct conflicts between wildlife and locals. Since May 2019 to date, the two teams have responded to 508 referrals.
- Innovative **compensatory measures** involve real-time replacement of domestic animals killed by large carnivores. The organisation has voluntarily donated 38 sheep and nine cows in exchange for those lost by 22 local residents as a result of the attacks.



Wildlife monitoring

- This season we have collected 84 DNA samples from wolves.
- Detailed knowledge of the populations of these species is particularly important, as it helps us to adapt our management decisions to ensure their coexistence in the future.
- Due to the media interest in the subject, we have organised a preliminary info trip communicating the results we have so far. The study will be finalised next winter.
- Our estimated density is somewhere around 2.35 wolves/10,000 hectares, significantly higher than in northern European countries, but also twice the density found in Yellowstone Park in the USA.










- We welcomed three new bison that came from Bad Berleburg and Bad Laasphe/Feudingen, Germany and we are making arrangements to receive others from Sweden.
- They will form another herd and we plan to release them this summer.



- We have relocated a bear that caused damage in the Lereşti/Voina area.
- Unfortunately, some of the problems have been provoked by the inappropriate behaviour of villagers.
 Only in the last few weeks we have discovered two cases where dead livestock was dumped at the edge of villages, or where leftovers from an abattoir were deposited at the edge of farms as dog food. In all cases, bears were attracted by the smell of meat.
- Habituation is a sad consequence of this. In the end, everyone loses: livestock farmers face attacks on their cattle and sheep, and eventually these problem bears may have to be shot if they lose their fear of humans.






Wildlife management

- We continue to push wild boar back into the woods to avoid the destruction of meadows around the villages and we verify the maintenance of the electric fences in use that we have installed at local farms.
- As part of our preventative measures, we have established fields of over half a hectare with wildlife fodder at some abandoned grasslands above Satic and Rucar. These provide an attraction for wild boar, and keep them from descending to the meadows around the communities. We will also plant fruit trees on these meadows in order to create more diversity and autumn food for wildlife.





Wildlife monitoring

- We have restarted the monitoring of golden eagles. We will focus our efforts on certain areas based on the results of last year.
- It is very rare to find wolf tracks in winter at 1,900 m altitude, but our ornithologist found some.



Conservation Enterprise Programme



Busy life at the farm:

- Maintenance of the Brielmaier mowers before the start of the haymaking season.
- Cleaning up pastures.
- Rebuilding of woven twig fences.
- Building a new shelter for the caretakers of our horse livery area.
- Planting green fencing (local bush species) to partition horse pastures.
- Routine veterinary treatment of horses and cattle.









Cobor Biodiversity Farm

- Sprinkled with stands of ancient oaks, the pastures in the Southcentral Transylvania are among the most valuable natural pastures left in Europe. Romania's five largest oak pastures (some over 1,000 ha) are all within a 20 km radius of Cobor village.
- Over three years ago we started a project to restore these oak pastures at the Cobor Biodiversity Farm.
- This spring, together with our partner form Transylmagica Association and also with the help received from the Ţara Făgăraşului Bikeathon event, we have managed to plant 200 oak saplings, with a large participation of volunteers and village kids.




Volunteers

Communication & community outreach



- National Park Bayerischer Wald Germany became a study area for a group of local decision makers from the Făgăraş Mountains.
- This National Park covers 24,250 ha, attracts 1.4 million visitors/year and generates 52 million Euro/year income from tourism activities for the local communities.
- We had a lot to learn about its infrastructure, how education programmes are enrolled, how the logistics of such a park functions, what employment opportunities it offers, and how people can participate in the park's volunteer programmes. And a lot to envision for the area of the Făgăraş Mountains once it becomes the largest forested National Park in Europe.









- The Făgăraş Mountains are one of the richest areas in terms of nature and culture in Romania, including gastronomic culture.
- In 2021, we started a free consultancy programme for small entrepreneurs in the villages around the Făgăraş Mountains.
- The authorisation of several Local Gastronomic Points is a novelty for Argeş County, and we are pleased to invite you to the <u>first Local</u> <u>Gastronomic Point</u> in our project area, authorised with the support of our Conservation Enterprises Programme.
- Visitors can enjoy home-cooked food made from locally produced raw materials.



- Casa Bună Association continues its activities in Nucșoara and Lerești communes, in the Făgăraș Mountains.
- Packages with food, a workshop on child safety on the Internet and the periodical IT visit comprised the latest programme of the team. And, of course, on-line lessons with the volunteers.
- We are a few more 'bricks' away until we have all the <u>funding</u> for the day centre we want to build in Nucsoara.








Virtual gallery

- 20 teachers from Braşov county have attended the training session Educator for Nature, organised by ProPark Foundation for Protected Areas.
- Experiential education is a relatively new concept for Romania and we are proud to have introduced it here.
- Five intensive days with theoretical information about the protected areas and the Făgăraş Mountains and a lot of interactive sessions including exercises that teachers may apply to their classes.
- With this course we have now trained 40 teachers for a combination of formal and informal education in Argeş and Braşov counties.












