



Forest conservation and management



• In September, we were able to purchase an additional 11.5 ha of forests for protection.








Ecological restoration



- Before the snow comes, we need to cut the grass around the saplings planted during earlier seasons to prevent the fragile plants suffocating.
- We do this with the help of 48 locals coordinated by our colleagues, on three ecological restoration sites. Tending the plants usually has to be continued for about five years after replanting.






- We have restored the forest floor along over 1400 m of logging tracks in the Groapele restoration site.
- Autumn planting is usually short. We hope to have good weather conditions and to restore the forest over an area of 45 ha.

Greenhouses and tree nurseries

- The ongoing work in the tree nurseries and greenhouses is intensive as we prepare the next generation of forests: weeding and planting are the most important tasks.
- This autumn's planting will be done with saplings exclusively from our nurseries.



We have collected beech nuts, rowan and sycamore seeds and planted them.

- We have continued the activity of eradicating invasive alien plant species (IAS): *Erigeron annuus* (daisy fleabane) and *Conyza canadensis* (Canadian horseweed) in the Dâmboviţei and Dragoslovenilor Valleys.
- We selected eight sample areas in which we took fixed-point photographs (FPP) accompanied by botanical surveys to monitor the evolution of invasive alien plant species in the Tămaş and Râul Târgului Valleys.
- 20 plots across the Dâmboviţa Valley area were monitored for the impact of the restoration activities on degraded habitats (spruce monocultures).





 External specialists continued to monitor changes in the diversity and abundance of terrestrial arthropods in the Cumpăna and Vâlsan Valleys, and in the Groape area.







Wildlife monitoring

- The acclimatization enclosure is ready, and all procedures have been completed to receive bison in the Nucşoara area, the third reintroduction area of the Făgăraş Mountains. The bison will arrive here in October, from Slovakia, Germany and Sweden.
- 36 bison are now roaming free in the Făgăraş Mountains accompanied by six healthy calves and we continue monitoring the herds.





• We participated in the Bison Returned To Janoviskie Forest Conference in Poland, a great opportunity to talk about our results in the Făgăraş Mountains and to share best practices with other colleagues.





- All the CARPATHIA team contributed in collecting DNA from bear scat and hair, in order to reach our target to collect 900 samples for our brown bear census using genetic methods. We are nearly there, thanks to the efforts of our field team.
- We look forward to comparing the current results to the ones obtained in the <u>first study</u> in 2017-2018.





Wildlife monitoring









- We have installed camera traps for monitoring the red deer rut.
- Due to the appearance of bears in village orchards and close to the communities we have installed several electrical fences to prevent damage.

Cobor Biodiversity Farm

Cobor Biodiversity Farm

- The pastures dotted with ancient oak trees around the village of Cobor are among the most valuable natural pastures left in Europe. Due to the mismanagement (cutting or burning them without regeneration) of hayfields and the loss of traditional agriculture, these pastures began to lose their oaks and with them their natural value.



- We attended the annual meeting organised within the framework of the ELP – Endangered Landscapes Programme, a programme funded by the Arcadia Fund and implemented by the Cambridge Conservation Initiative in the United Kingdom.
- The meeting was hosted by the Turkish Mediterranean Conservation Society. The main topics discussed were protected areas and naturepositive enterprises.
- We discussed innovative ideas on ways to support local communities and solutions to improve their economic situation.




Foundation Conservation Carpathia Film Series
