


Forest conservation and management




Every year in March, the whole world celebrates the International Day of Forests.

At Carpathia, we celebrate forests every day by restoring and protecting these priceless natural resources.











March brought unexpected weather to the Făgăraș Mountains, with spring seemingly in a bad mood and two seasons making an appearance.












The weather caused several dangerous trees to fall on a road near Vidraru dam. But thanks to our Carpathian Forestry Association colleagues, the road was quickly cleared and made safe again.

We donated the timber (over 70 cubic metres of wood) to Arefu Town Hall to support families in need of firewood and local institutions in the Arefu commune.

It's just one way we're working to support people who rely on the forests.










No matter what the weather conditions may be, our colleagues are always out in the field, patrolling the forests to guarantee their safety and protection.

Ecological restoration

- We wasted no time in rolling up our sleeves and getting to work in our tree nurseries.
- We've been hard at work taking young dwarf pine and spruce saplings out of the greenhouses and transplanting them in the tree nurseries.
- Here, they'll continue to grow for another 2-4 years until they're ready to be planted out in the mountains.
- We've also been busy selecting and preparing saplings to be planted during the restoration activities.

- We've started ecological restoration work at not one, but five different sites: Dobroneagu, Groapele, Valea Dâmboviţei, Cumpăna and Pojarna. Our aim for this spring is to restore an area of 73.9 ha with a total of 240,000 saplings.
- As an experiment, in addition to our traditional seedling planting, we are testing the direct planting of seeds into the ground, and in hard-to-reach areas we will be using drones.











- To ensure the success of our restoration efforts, before planting, we built three natural refrigerators in the mountains of Văsălatul Valley, Alunu and Dobroneagu to preserve the saplings.
- Basically, we built three storage areas out of snow or ice and soil to keep the seedlings of spruce, beech, sycamore and fir in.
- However, due to low precipitation this winter, we've made a tremendous effort to bring the snow and ice from other areas.












- We have started conversion work in areas of artificial spruce monocultures.
- We're creating pockets of light and planting deciduous species, such as beech, sycamore, rowan, and elm.
- This will brighten the interior of these forests and create space for the natural regeneration and planting of saplings.











Media trip

- Journalists from various national publications accepted our invitation to come and see how we're restoring the Făgăraş Mountains, which have been devastated by illegal logging.
- They visited the 200-hectare
 Dobroneagu restoration site, which
 was affected by logging in 2008-2010
 and a storm in February 2020 that
 caused the loss of 160 hectares.
- On average, more than 40 people work on this ecological restoration site for 3-4 weeks each season.










During the last week, winter returned to the Făgăraş
Mountains and we've had to stop working for now. As soon
as the weather improves, we'll be back to continue our
restoration efforts with the help of seasonal workers from
the local communities.




Wildlife management

- As the sun sets over the Făgăraş Mountains, our rapid intervention teams are ready to go.
- Whether it's a call about a wild boar causing trouble near villages or the presence of a bear, our teams work day and night. We're proud that the locals trust us to handle these situations, instead of putting themselves in harm's way.







- The intervention teams are actively engaged in a range of activities, including:
- anti-poaching patrols
- installing and checking camera trap data
- installation and maintenance of electric fences
- testing of a real-time monitoring and signalling system for detected sounds, such as chainsaw, vehicle and gun noise, to help combat poaching and illegal activities.







We launched consultations for the 'Bear Smart Community' programme, in partnership with the Argeş Regional Environmental Protection Agency.

We had the first meeting with key institutions in bear conflict management in Arges County.

This programme promotes collaborative efforts to reduce human-bear conflicts, recognizing that all parties share the responsibility.

The participation of authorities, municipalities and citizens is crucial for its effectiveness.



Wildlife reintroductions

- We are preparing for another bison release. This spring, 12 bison will make their way to the Făgăraş Mountains from our third acclimatisation enclosure near Nucșoara in Argeş County.
- The ultimate goal of our reintroduction project in the Făgăraş Mountains is to release a total of 75 individuals by mid-2024.
- We are conducting field analyses to find potential reintroduction areas for bison in the Leaota Mountains.










- ARTE TV recently visited our bison in the Făgăraş Mountains for a four-day filming expedition.

Media trip

We are excited that our bison are receiving national recognition for their unique and captivating journey in the Făgăraş Mountains.

12 journalists from various national and local media accepted our invitation to visit the third reintroduction point in the Făgăraș Mountains, at Dobroneagu, near the Nucșoara commune, Argeș county.









Wildlife reintroductions

Our beaver team has been busy all month:

- monitoring the released beaver population on the south side of the Făgăraş Mountains,
- obtaining authorisation for newcomers
- initiating collaboration with the Senckenberg Institute for the analysis of biological samples collected from captured beavers. This collaboration will help us better understand the health and behaviour of these animals and inform our conservation efforts moving forward.







 We have started monitoring the golden eagle population by installing feeding points and camera traps.







Wildlife monitoring

- The rangers continued the sampling of wolf scat and urine for DNA analysis. We have collected 134 samples, out of a target of 250. Due to a lack of snow during December and January, it was almost impossible to find wolf tracks and follow them.
- We have decided to extend the collection period until the end of May, as the spring turned back into winter in the mountains and is helping us a great deal.









- We installed camera traps in order to test a new method of estimating the population density of the wolf's main prey – the red deer.
- Our colleagues and our volunteers are installing and checking camera trap information and centralising the information in our database.




- We are continuing to restore the historic oak pastures at Cobor. Thanks to our efforts, another 150 oak (Quercus petraea) seedlings are taking root.
- Each sapling is planted in a specific location, marked on a GPS map. It is surrounded by a 'thorn fortress' to protect it from animals.
- We are carrying out this project with the support of the OAK Foundation, together with the Transylmagica Association, but also with the support of our friends who donated to the Ţara Făgărașului Bikeathon.


- Together with our colleagues from the Conservation Enterprises, we have started a video series to promote the small producers of the Roadele Munţilor Food Hub.
