Forest conservation and management




#24 May #European National Parks Day

The first national park in Romania was established in 1935, in the Retezat Mountains. Now we have 13 national parks and the Danube Delta Biosphere Reserve.

We hope to celebrate this day as soon as possible with a new national park, the most impressive forested park in Europe: the Făgăraș Mountains National Park.

Until then, we will continue our work to protect the forests, to maintain wildlife habitats, reintroduce bison and beaver to the Făgăraș Mountains and develop community programmes and projects.











This is what many areas of the Făgăraș Mountains looked like in April, and the situation created difficulties especially for the restoration teams.


We have witnessed the arrival of late snowfall. It seems that winter is trying to extend its presence beyond its usual boundaries in the calendar and move into other months.





Ecological restoration

- Our team has achieved impressive results in the restoration work, despite challenging winter conditions.
- This spring, we were able to plant a vast area of 85 hectares of forest.
- A remarkable total of 338,562 fir, spruce, beech, alder and mountain ash saplings were carefully planted.
- Your <u>contributions</u> and public funding have made these achievements possible.











 These significant results bring us closer to the vision of tomorrow's forests in the Făgăraş Mountains, playing a crucial role in mitigating climate change.












 The help of the trusty donkeys has been invaluable in transporting seedlings to inaccessible areas where conventional vehicles cannot go.









- We continued to restore the alder corridors in the Doamnei River floodplain. We received direct support from the Argeş Forestry Directorate, Domneşti Forest Department.
- We are restoring the alder corridors that border the river valleys and play a very important ecological role, stabilising the banks against flooding and stopping their erosion.







Green houses and tree nurseries

- Continuous care of the seedlings in the greenhouses.
- Seeding spruce trees.
- We've been taking young dwarf pine and spruce saplings out of the greenhouses and transplanting them into the tree nurseries.
- Irrigation of crops in the green houses.











- At the end of April, Mihai Zotta, our Conservation Director, attended the annual meeting of the SUPERB project in Bordeaux.
- SUPERB is the largest transboundary forest ecosystem restoration initiative in Europe.




Wildlife monitoring

• Wolf Census 2022-2023: We have completed the systematic collection of field samples. Due to lack of snow during December and January, we collected 142 samples out of a target of 250 wolf samples (October-April). We will continue to collect on an opportunistic basis throughout the year.

Intensive ungulate monitoring: With 108 of 133 cameras installed, our teams are reaching new heights on the mountain.

Thanks to our dedicated team and volunteers, we've set up 4 teams to install the cameras and centralise the data in our database.









Goodbye to Guillaume Fruquiere, our French volunteer who spent five months with us.

As well as helping to collect genetic samples for the wolf census and setting up camera traps, Guillaume took beautiful field photographs and shared fascinating stories from the field with us.







We organised the on-site travel of the arthropod specialist team to the project areas. Their mission? To set the field traps for the epigean fauna in the spruce monocultures and along the river banks, in the areas of Dâmboviţa Valley, Richita, Tămaş Valley, Cuca Valley, Valea Ursului, Râuşor.







Wildlife reintroductions

Bison reintroduction:

We have released 20 bison in the Făgăraș Mountains from all our reintroduction points: Bunea, Lerești and Nucșoara. They now roam freely in the breathtaking wilderness of the Făgăraș Mountains.

We're closely monitoring the bison groups both in the enclosures and in the wild.









Beaver reintroduction:

We've been busy trapping beavers from the northern side of the Făgăraș Mountains. We're working to reintroduce these hardworking creatures to the southern side of the Făgăraș Mountains to help maintain a balanced ecosystem.









Vulture reintroduction:

The majestic vultures might return to the Făgăraș Mountains!

We're currently in the preparation phase, analysing field data to identify conditions and the best sites for their reintroduction.

We aim to provide the right habitat for these magnificent birds to be able to thrive once again in the Făgăraş Mountains.









Wildlife management

- Over the Easter period, we collected waste to solve the problem of animal waste being dumped on the edge of farms and villages.
- This practice attracts bears because of the smell of the meat.
- Since Easter, some of the farmers in Rucăr commune have been bringing their animal waste to the collection point we organised in cooperation with Rucăr Town Hall.
- A specialised company collected and incinerated the waste, with all the costs covered by us.
- In this way, some of the bear attractions in Rucăr have been removed.
- We hope that this is a significant step forward in the prevention of humanbear conflicts.







- To mitigate wildlife conflicts, we continue to maintain and monitor the electric fences installed on local farms, particularly in high-risk areas.
- Additionally, we've taken proactive measures by planting fields with wildlife feed.
- This strategy provides an alternative food source for wild boars, discouraging them from venturing into grasslands around communities.








- Our day and night patrols ensure the monitoring of areas frequented by bears. We've also installed camera traps across all five of our wildlife management units to monitor these areas.
- We intensified patrols in the Voina area following reports of bear presence and subsequent damage.
- Our intervention team chased the bear away several times.
- We are trying to catch this bear as soon as possible, but unfortunately and strangely, the owners of houses and cabins in the area do not call 112 when this bear appears...







Carpathian shepherd dogs programme

- We are excited to announce that Aspra has 8 puppies of that we will donate to local farmers that use the meadows of the Făgăraş Mountains area.

 Carpathian shepherd dogs is part of
 the foundation's strategy to prevent
 the damage caused by large
 carnivores among livestock.
