
Forest conservation and management



- In 2023, we successfully purchased 191 hectares for full protection.
- By protecting and fully conserving 27,027 hectares of mountain forests and alpine grasslands, we are actively contributing to a healthier future.
- The full biodiversity of these forests is crucial to maintaining an essential balance, playing a key role in climate regulation, natural processes and the provision of vital resources for all.













Ecological restoration



- This autumn's planting campaign
 was the most intensive so far due to
 the difficult site conditions (steep
 slopes, difficult access) and the
 early arrival of winter high in the
 mountains.
- However, we managed to exceed our target and planted 85,700 seedlings of beech, spruce, sycamore, rowan, juniper, dwarf pine, swiss pine in four ecological restoration sites in the Făgăraş Mountains: Pojarna, Zârna, Berivoiu and Dobroneagu.










- This year we successfully planted 432,562 saplings (trees planted in clear-cuts, riparian galleries and restoration areas of spruce monocultures).
- Our progress brings us ever closer to our goal of planting 5 million seedlings, a concerted effort to restore natural forests and alpine pastures in the Făgăraş Mountains.

Trees

- In November, we organised an ecological restoration camp for 16 children in the vicinity of the Făgăraş Mountains as part of the SUPERB project (Systemic solutions for upscaling of urgent ecosystem restoration for forest-related biodiversity and ecosystem services), the largest cross-border forest landscape restoration project in Europe.
- Through games, walks and field observations, the children learnt how hard it is to restore a forest and what the extensive process of ecological restoration means.
- In December, we organised a workshop for representatives of forestry departments, forest guards and local authorities. We presented the good practice results of the SUPERB project.









Greenhouses and tree nurseries

- We have had a productive year in our tree nurseries, with a steady stream of activity resulting in the production and care of the seedlings needed for our restoration programme.
- Our team of four staff is supplemented by 38 daily workers from local communities who grow the saplings from seed and care for them in the nurseries for 2 to 5 years until they are ready to be planted in the mountains.
- We work without chemicals and weed by hand, and from now on we hope for a thick blanket of snow to protect the seedlings and seeds until spring.









 We came to the aid of the elderly people of Dâmbovicioara, who were suffering from a lack of firewood, by providing 70 cubic metres of wood.

Wildlife conservation



Wildlife monitoring

- We disseminated the results of our DNA monitoring wolf programme (Canis lupus), using non-invasive DNA sampling, through a comprehensive communication and dissemination campaign.
- The study monitored the wolf population in the Southern Carpathians over an area of 1,400 km², focusing on a pilot area covering the eastern part of the Făgăraş Mountains, Piatra Craiului, lezer-Păpuşa and Leaota Mountains.

Our invitation to witness first-hand the implementation of our non-invasive DNA sampling wolf monitoring project in the Romanian Carpathians, and to hear the results directly from our team of experts, was warmly accepted by journalists from various national and local publications. In total, 263 pieces of materials appeared as a result of this media trip, with an estimated total audience of 6,072,617 people reached.











Wildlife monitoring

- We are working hard to monitor ungulates with camera traps. In December we stepped up our team effort and carried out an intensive check of the 127 cameras installed in the field.
- We continue to monitor the lynx species at the 77 locations (each with two camera traps) with infrared motion sensors installed in the field. This method is effective for studying cat populations, whose fur have a unique pattern which is different from individual to individual.
- We look forward to the results of this second study, which we are conducting in a pilot area of over 1200 km² in the eastern Făgăraş, Piatra Craiului and Leaota Mountains.










Wildlife reintroductions

- As the year comes to a close, the Făgăraş Mountains are welcoming more bison into their wilderness.
- Two males and six females from Hungary, Germany and Sweden are ready for a new life in the natural habitat of the Făgăraş Mountains.
- Their reintroduction into the wild is planned for 2024. The ongoing process of reintroducing bison to the Făgăraş Mountains is progressing well, as evidenced by the thriving wild herds and the arrival of six new calves this summer.







Wildlife reintroductions

- This year we were able to relocate 18 beavers to the southern area of the Făgăraş Mountains.
- We've been monitoring their progress closely and are pleased to report that the beavers have adapted very well to their new environment. A tangible sign of the success of our efforts is the birth of young kits at the reintroduction sites.







Wildlife management

- Our dedicated intervention teams have been working hard to protect small farmers and reduce wildlife conflict in the Făgăraş Mountains.
- Over the course of the year, our colleagues carried out 107 interventions and installed 27 electric fences in areas at risk of wildlife conflict.
- We used various strategies to prevent recurrent attacks, including artificial intelligence-based alarm systems and relocation efforts, and occasionally had to resort to removing individuals when all other options had failed.





Wildlife management

 As part of our voluntary compensation programme for damage caused by wild animals, we contributed by providing 48 sheep to nine farmers in the communes of Rucar, Sătic, Stoenești and Nămăești.








Documentary film about the old trees and people of Nucșoara

- Together with WaterBear Network, the first interactive streaming platform dedicated to the future of our planet, and our long-term partner Jack Wolfskin, we launched 'Spirit of the Forest'.
- At the heart of the documentary is the <u>'Forest with Immortal Stories</u>' project, carried out in partnership with Nucşoara TownHall, with the aim of preserving 2,544 ancient beech trees through adoption and promoting the area as a tourist destination of high natural value.






















Carpathia Ambassador Programme








Mentions in international media


